

Dear Friends of Homes of Joy,

It's hard to believe that 2021 is already drawing to a close, and our family of young girls and staff are busy finishing up the school year in Zambia. It seems like a long time since we were able to send someone to Zambia (our last in-person site visit was in 2016) to meet the girls and staff in person. Fortunately, through social media and WhatsApp, we have been able to keep in regular contact through the wonderful staff at both Nyumba Yanga and Future in My Hands. We are pleased to provide you with the following updates as a result:

COVID-19

Over the past few months, cases in Zambia have been on a steady decline, with substantial improvements to vaccine rollout and access across the country. Zambian Health Minister Sylvia Masebo has expressed confidence within the last week that Zambia is set on the right trajectory to hit the 8.4 million threshold in the COVID-19 vaccination program with continued community engagement and outreach to combat vaccine hesitancy. However, watching the current trends in Europe, she warns that Zambia may be headed toward a 4th wave this festive season and into early 2022. We are very pleased that the girls have remained in good health, thanks to significant health and sanitation efforts and education in both projects. There were some positive cases amongst the Sisters at both projects and 4 girls at FIMH, but thankfully all have recovered and the Sisters acted fast to reduce any further transmission. So far the girls who tested positive for COVID-19, are not presenting with any ongoing long-term effects.

UPDATE FROM NYUMBA YANGA

As in Canada, the girls have experienced many starts and stops in their school year, as it was necessary to lockdown and close schools due to the pandemic. We are pleased to report that the girls came through these academic interruptions very well. In order to help them through the lockdown periods, we were asked to send some emergency funds (\$5000.00 CDN) to purchase laptops. These laptops were used at Nyumba Yanga to allow the girls to keep up with their schoolwork and study remotely. This expense was not in the budget or funds initially sent for 2021, but the Board felt it was something that we needed to do through our Disaster Relief fund. A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to this fund over the past two years, making decisions like this possible!

We recently learned that we have three new graduates at the Grade 7 level. Congratulations to Anastasia, Maureen and Anna M. for a job well done! These three young girls will be moving on up to Future In My Hands in January 2022 to start grade 8, allowing space for four new girls to arrive at Nyumba Yanga.









Health checks were completed with all girls thanks to Sister Rose (who is also a medical doctor) and doctors from Levy Mwanawasa Hospital, and thankfully the girls are all quite healthy aside from a few needing additional support with minor vision and skin issues.

Growth continues with the garden project as well, and the Nyumba Yanga garden provided an exceptional harvest of maize and groundnuts this Fall (much to the girls' delight, as groundnuts are a favourite snack and key ingredient in many Zambian sauces).



We have received our budget proposal for 2022 from Nyumba Yanga and are being asked to support elementary education for 40 girls (which is similar to 2021). Unfortunately, with the additional mid-year emergency fund request, our funds are currently at an **all-time low** and we are asking for support to "Enhance Elementary Education" in our Giving Tuesday campaign this year.

FUTURE IN MY HANDS

All the girls have worked very hard academically this year, despite the difficulties brought-on by the pandemic. The number of girls that we have attending FIMH is

also increasing. For 2022, we are looking at supporting 15 girls from Grade 8-12 with their educational needs. This is because instead of just accepting girls who move up from Nyumba Yanga, FIMH is now accepting urgent cases from the local rural Lusaka West community. The first year with this change was very successful and has had wonderful social benefits as the girls who have grown up together at Nyumba Yanga have worked to incorporate new members into their FIMH family. Another key highlight, is that FIMH has now received government approval/recognition for students to write their government exams at FIMH (instead of having to outsource externally). This is an additional level of verification for the school which will help with costs and recognition of the status of the FIMH school moving forward. All the high school girls are currently writing their end of year exams, and we hope for strong results and good news in December!

POST SECONDARY

As we mentioned in our last newsletter, we are delighted to announce that we have our first college graduate, Memory. Her graduation ceremony took place on November 19th. Our hope was to be able to send Micaela and Susan to be able to attend the ceremony, but the current travel restrictions did not allow for that. However, we all wished Memory success on her special day through a special note and photos sent to her on social media the morning of her ceremony and she expressed her extreme gratitude to all of you who have supported her once again! We wish her all the best in her chosen career of nursing, and are very proud that she is currently helping to administer Covid-19 vaccines, and providing health and safety education in a local clinic in Lusaka.




WINTER 2021

Enhancing Elementary Education in 2022. This Giving Tuesday we are focusing on raising funds to support our Nyumba Yanga Project for our Elementary School girls!

Once again, we are using **Giving Tuesday** (Nov 30th) to launch our holiday fundraising efforts and to lead right into World AIDS Day on December 1st. Our girls are HIV/AIDS orphans and have experienced the devastating impacts of the AIDS



pandemic directly. This year, our Nyumba Yanga Project has also been severely impacted by additional costs. These include important resources needed to keep the girls safe, and keep them engaged through remote education during the Covid-19 pandemic.

All funds raised on Giving Tuesday will specifically support education costs (tuition, uniforms, supplies, exam fees etc.) for our Elementary School girls for 2022. So, we humbly ask you to consider donating to help honour the resilience of our girls and make an important impact on opening doors for their futures.
